

# The incredible story of a turnaround

eghalaya, blessed with immense natural beauty and resources, is one of India's smallest states—22nd in terms of area and 24th in population. Yet, the north-eastern state, which shares international border with Bangladesh, is unique in many ways. With an average annual rainfall of 1,150 cm, Meghalaya, which literally means abode of cloud, receives the highest amount of rainfall in the country. Recognised as a state of Indian Union, it may be just 50-year-old, but in 2018, the International Commission on Stratigraphy, which has divided the Holocene epoch into three subdivisions, named the late Holocene as the Meghalayan age. A speleothem in Mawmluh cave, which indicates, a dramatic worldwide climate event around 2250 BCE, has been chosen as the boundary stratotype.

The year 2018 also saw another change in Meghalaya—Conrad K. Sangma, only 40-year-old then, took charge of the state. It was a baptism by fire for the son of former Lok Sabha speaker PA Sangma, the most illustrious political leader from the north-east. The state was reeling under economic distress, corruption, socio-political frictions, and a collective sense of despair. Armed with a management degree from the prestigious Imperial College in United Kingdom, Chief Minister Conrad Sangma hit the ground running and set his priorities—sector-specific policies for economic development and ensuring their speedy execution.

Chief Minister Conrad Sangma created task forces for formulating policies on education, telecom, youth, and sports. The objective was to frame policies considering the concerns of all stakeholders. Several policies, including on industries and tourism, were revisited. Every area of growth was spotted and encouraged. The microscopic focus was evident from the beginning.

To fundamentally transform the agriculture sector, his government launched a scheme termed FOCUS (Farmers Collectivization for Upscaling Production and Marketing System). This flagship initiative for the state's producers envisages the bottom-up collectivization of producers into groups. The producer groups are provided an amount of Rs 5,000 per producer as a group corpus for increasing production and productivity. This programme is a firm step to empower the farmers of Meghalaya so that they can come together and solve their immediate problems. Within a year, the programme has been a grand success. It currently covers almost 19,000 producer groups comprising 2,50,000 families, 330 cooperative societies and about 80 aggregation and

processing centres. Hundreds of success stories are emerging from the FOCUS program.

Taking inspiration from the success and demand of the FOCUS programme, CM Sangma's government recently launched the FOCUS+ programme. Under this, an unconditional and untied annual cash benefit of R. 5,000 is being provided to each producer household to take any farm production-related activity. With the FOCUS and the FOCUS+ programmes, each rural household will receive a cash benefit of Rs 10,000 per annum.

Another focus is on horticulture. Even though Meghalaya is known for its horticulture, the state never had a food processing directorate. Sangma created one and sanctioned Rs 80 crore for our first project the Jackfruit Mission.

The administration, from top to bottom, was given categorical objectives-ensuring livelihoods for all, building infrastructure for growth, nurturing the youth and children, empowering women, providing good governance and welfare to all, and making Meghalaya one of the top 10 states in the country in next 10 years, in in GSDP per capita and SDG ranking. Several departments were restructured to create synergy and ensure faster delivery. But more importantly, what Chief Minister Conrad Sangma wanted to achieve first was taking the fruits of development to every citizen of Meghalaya. "Development has no meaning if it is not inclusive. Every citizen must be equal stakeholder in the process. In these last four years, we haven't left any section of the society behind. We are committed to include all the sections of the society and facilitate in their physical and social well-being," says Conrad Sangma.

It was a highly challenging journey, made even more difficult by Covid pandemic which hit the state, along with the rest of the world, in 2020. The flight to growth, prosperity and social justice came to a grinding halt as mankind began fighting back the onslaught of an invisible virus. But there was no scope to pause for long.

Meghalaya followed a unique collaborative approach in dealing with the Covid challenges, by involving the community leaders, localities, religious institutions and above all the people of the state. While the state government upgraded the infrastructure of several health facilities on war-footing, it fundamentally introduced a new model—"Behaviour Change Model for living with COVID-19"—which involves treating every resident



as an asymptomatic carrier of the virus. An order was issued to treat everyone in the state as "Category 'A' patients unless they are tested on a continuous basis. The 'Category A' patient had to follow three nonnegotiable practices: compulsory mask-wearing, hand hygiene and social distancing. This practice involved vigilant de-centralized monitoring by the communities. Hence, people in the state could perform their usual livelihood activities. In the pandemic year alone, Meghalaya witnessed a never seen before growth in rural roads—2.2 km roads were constructed every day.

Even as the collective battle against the lethal virus continues, Meghalaya and the world limped back to what can be called "normal". The "engine" for development was re-ignited and the programmes and policies to resolve the various unmet needs of the different sections of the society were put on fast track.

This year, as the state celebrates 50 years of statehood, the momentous occasion provides an opportunity to showcase the unprecedented socio-economic development Meghalaya witnessed in last four years under the leadership of Chief Minister Conrad Sangma. And the backbone of this developmental journey has been good governance. "We are building a brand Meghalaya on which every citizen can capitalize and benefit. Together, we have taken significant strides in the development of the state through collaborative governance, decisive leadership, and determination," says Conrad Sangma.

And the results are showing. The government has provided rural employment to a greater number of people and financially empowered more women than ever before. It has provided improved and innovative health care, ensured safe and uninterrupted supply of water and electricity, and implemented specific programmes for prosperity and welfare of our farmers. The youth in Meghalaya now have more facilities and opportunities. Efforts were made to decentralise the power structure so that people could participate in the process of development at the grassroots level. The change is visible across all categories—infrastructure development, healthcare, education, power generation, job creation, women empowerment,



prosperity of farmers, skill development, youth and child welfare, connectivity, tourism, and hospitality.

The decisive leadership of the chief minister left a mark in every domain—from generating external financial assistance to solving border disputes with neighbouring states. Multiple external agencies showed faith in Chief Minister Conrad Sangma's vision for Meghalaya and consequently the state witnessed a three-fold increase in external financing touching Rs 7,886.5 crore. He also did not hesitate to sit for candid and transparent dialogue with Assam Chief Minister Dr Himanta Biswa Sarma over six out of 12 disputed border areas. These initiatives are bound to bring results sooner than expected.

Following the historic 2019 judgement by Supreme Court upholding the rights of tribal people over the land and minerals, mining has once again resumed in the state, bringing back livelihood opportunities to many in Meghalaya. The state government is taking all possible measures to encourage and ensure scientific mining.

The good news did not end there. Conrad Sangma genuinely believes that there is a huge potential for international trade between Meghalaya and neighbouring country Bangladesh. As a leader who steers clear of rhetoric and believe in walking the talk, he became the first Meghalaya chief minister to visit Jaintapur, an ancient kingdom, now a sub-division in Bangladesh. During his four-day-long tour to Bangladesh in 2019, Conrad Sangma also called on Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina in Dhaka and talked at length on several issues concerning Meghalaya and Bangladesh.

While Conrad Sangma-led Meghalaya Democratic Alliance has completed four years in power, the chief minister has no time to celebrate and pause. The road is long, and the state is burdened with a legacy of historical underperformance and political mismanagement. That makes the accomplishments of last four years even more significant.

But Conrad Sangma is in no mood to claim credit yet. He sees this spike in the developmental curve of the state as a collective achievement of the people of Meghalaya. "I want to thank all our citizens for their support and contributions in building Meghalaya. I feel proud to be leading this amazing journey of building Meghalaya as a vibrant, caring, robust economy and society," he says.



- Mini secretariat offices at Tura and Jowai are being constructed to decentralize the governance and reduce the gap between citizen and the state


# Focus on farmers

- Rs 5,000 transferred annually to 4,50,000 farming households
- 86,000 Kisan Credit Card holders received interest free loans
- 40,000 women farmers benefited
- 185 Collective Marketing Centres (CMC) created

### Meghalaya in Mission Mode

Multiple projects with specific thrust areas were taken up on mission mode, yielding incredible results

- Mission Lakadong: 15 CMCs and two processiong units set up. 12,998 farmers benefitted. Turmeric production reached 11,832 MT showing 66 per cent growth
- Megh-Aroma Mission: 235 Ha area under plantation with a budget of Rs 19 crore, covering 1,600 farmers, 6 IVCS, 9 VECs, 52 SHGs, 9 cooperative societies, and 4 farmers group. Annual oil production touched 3.5 tonnes.
- Meghalaya State Aquaculture Mission: Investment of Rs 378 crore; additional water area of 1,400 Ha for fish production, 7,000 fish farmers benefitted. Fish production touched 16,123 MT in 2020-21, 30 per cent increase
- Piggery Mission: Rs 44.8 crore disbursed to 253 co-operatives
- Mushroom Mission: Rs 62 Cr amount earmarked; 3,000 farmers to benefit from shiitake mushroom cultivation. Production of mushroom increased from 27 MT to 287.44 MT in past two years. Annual Spawn production doubled from 5.86 MT in 2015-18 to 11.80 MT in 2018-21.




